Eva Yerbabuena Looks to the Past and Future of Flamenco

Whenever the curtain rises on an Eva Yerbabuena recital, the invisible line that divides the audience from the stage appears to gain the ethereal quality of a mirror. To be in the presence of the famous bailaora (flamenco dancer) and choreographer is to witness the way in which energy flows between art and its spectator to create dialogue—a dance even—which inevitably brings us closer to our own humanity.

In Yerbagüena (Oscuro Brillante), the German-born Andalusian dancer sums up two decades' worth of her unique take on flamenco into a show that highlights what she does so well: celebrate the long history of flamenco while looking to the future.

Eva Yerbabuena Mira al Pasado y al Futuro del Flamenco

Cada vez que se abre el telón en un recital de Eva Yerbabuena, la línea invisible que divide al público del escenario parece adquirir la cualidad etérea de un espejo. Estar en presencia de la famosa bailaora y coreógrafa es presenciar la forma en que la energía fluye entre el arte y su espectador para crear un diálogo, una danza incluso, que inevitablemente nos acerca a nuestra propia humanidad.

En Yerbagüena (Oscuro Brillante), la bailaora andaluza nacida en Alemania resume dos décadas de su visión del flamenco en un espectáculo que destaca lo que sabe hacer tan bien: celebrar la larga historia y tradición del flamenco con los ojos puestos en su futuro.

The show makes its New York debut at City Center's Flamenco Festival, where Yerbabuena first performed almost 30 years ago. "Oscuro Brillante is a reflection of what we create when we are together, of those energies [that] make us vibrate," she shared recently during a rehearsal break from her studio in Spain. During the powerful showcase, she intends to explore "that question of what light we feed on when we are in a dark place."

Yerbagüena (Oscuro Brillante) is both intimate and epic. The bailaora (who also choreographs her own shows) appears onstage backed by four vocalists, percussionists, and a guitarist, who aid her as she transitions into four chapters where she evokes the process of metamorphosis. The show begins with a bang, "a brutal energy," as Yerbabuena describes it, which gives path to a more meditative state, where "the emphasis is no longer on flexibility, but on the contrary, it's rigidity."

To the compass of a bulería por soleá, a picaresque style that encourages a spoken exchange between the bailaora and her musicians, Yerbabuena opens a musical dialogue with the audience. The show incorporates various flamenco styles including alegría from La Alhambra, taranto from Almería, and tientos from Andalucía to highlight how "we really impregnate those vibrations that the music gives off," as she explains. The magic of flamenco wouldn't be possible without the work artists like Yerbabuena put into preserving its roots, while looking at the places the artform has yet to go.

In addition to Yerbabuena's work, City
Center's Flamenco Festival also features
shows by Manuel Liñan, Alfonso Losa, and
Patricia Guerrero, some of Spain's greatest
flamenco ambassadors. "We like to arrive
a little earlier to see each other [when we
travel], we enjoy it, it is wonderful and divine,"
says Yerbabuena about her colleagues. "I wish
that this would happen more often in Spain,"
where she sees the need for a permanent
house where flamenco can occur all year long.





El espectáculo hace su debut en Nueva York en el Festival de Flamenco del City Center, donde Yerbabuena actuó por primera vez hace casi 30 años. "Oscuro Brillante es una reflexión realmente de lo que generamos cuando estamos juntos, de esas energías que nos hacen vibrar", compartió recientemente durante un descanso de ensayo en su estudio en España. Durante la potente presentación, pretende explorar "esa pregunta de cuándo estamos en un oscuro de qué luz nos alimentamos".

Yerbagüena (Oscuro Brillante) es a la vez íntima y épica. La bailaora (que también coreografía sus propios espectáculos) aparece en escena acompañada por cuatro vocalistas, percusionistas y un guitarrista, que la ayudan en su transición a través de cuatro capítulos en los que evoca el proceso de la metamorfosis. El espectáculo comienza con un estallido, "una energía brutal", como lo describe Yerbabuena, que da paso a un estado más meditativo, "donde hacemos hincapié ya no en la flexibilidad sino todo lo contrario, en la rigidez".

Al compás de una bulería por soleá, un estilo picaresco que fomenta el intercambio hablado entre la bailaora y sus músicos, Yerbabuena abre un diálogo musical con el público. El espectáculo incorpora varios palos flamencos como la alegría de La Alhambra, el taranto de Almería y los tientos de Andalucía para resaltar cómo "cómo realmente impregnamos de esas vibraciones que despide la música", como explica. La magia del flamenco no sería posible sin el trabajo que artistas como Yerbabuena hacen para preservar sus raíces, mientras observan los lugares a los que esta forma de arte aún no ha llegado.

Además del trabajo de Yerbabuena, el Festival Flamenco del City Center también cuenta con espectáculos de Manuel Liñan, Alfonso Losa y Patricia Guerrero, algunos de los mayores embajadores del flamenco en España. "Nos gusta llegar un poco antes para vernos [cuando viajamos], lo disfrutamos, es maravilloso y divino", dice Yerbabuena sobre sus colegas. "Ojalá esto ocurriera más a menudo en España", donde ve la necesidad de una casa permanente donde el flamenco pueda presentarse durante todo el año.

The magic of flamenco wouldn't be possible without the work artists like Yerbabuena put into preserving its roots, while looking at the places the artform has yet to go.

After all, the dance, which was deemed an Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity by UNESCO in 2010, has become synonymous with its country of origin. "Flamenco is an art that has a very large mixture of many cultures," says Yerbabuena, who is known for her vibrantly eclectic combination of elements from across the globe (in her astonishing Cuentos de azúcar she was joined onstage by Japanese singer Anna Sato to weave a delicate stage dream). During a time when systems of power use difference to create the illusion of incompatibility, Yerbabuena's work is an urgent call to embracing the unfamiliar, "I am a woman who has a blind faith in culture because culture unites, it does not separate."

Although flamenco definitely is infused with magic, Yerbabuena clarifies that "magic seems like luck, but it has to catch you while working," which is why she doesn't rest on her laurels, counting on her gift to just manifest whenever she's onstage. "Technique has to be at the service of that which we consider magical," she explains.

Flamenco is hard work, "it's my job," she says, it's not dissimilar to what a banker or judge does on a daily basis, which is why the day will come when Yerbabuena is ready to walk off the stage one last time. "I would love that within the institutions it is understood that we also reach a moment when [flamenco artists] have to retire," and that labor conditions are so that they will be able to indulge in the fruit of life-long labor. "I would not like to make any kind of farewell show at all," she says, "I would like to just be able to say, now I can enjoy other things, I think it's time to go."

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Después de todo el baile, que fue declarado Patrimonio Cultural Inmaterial de la Humanidad por la UNESCO en 2010, se ha convertido en sinónimo de su país de origen. "El flamenco es un arte que tiene una mezcolanza muy grande de muchas culturas", dice Yerbabuena, que es conocida por su combinación vibrante y ecléctica de elementos de todo el mundo (en sus asombrosos Cuentos de azúcar se le unió en el escenario la cantante japonesa Anna Sato para tejer un delicado sueño escénico). En una época en la que los sistemas de poder utilizan la diferencia para crear la ilusión de incompatibilidad, la obra de Yerbabuena es una llamada urgente a abrazar lo desconocido: "Soy una mujer que tiene una fe ciega en lo que es la cultura porque la cultura une, no separa".

Aunque el flamenco sí que tiene magia, Yerbabuena aclara que "la magia igual que la suerte te tiene que pillar trabajando", por eso no se duerme en sus laureles y confía en que su don se manifieste siempre que esté sobre el escenario. "La técnica tiene que estar al servicio de aquello que consideramos mágico", explica. El flamenco es un trabajo duro, "es mi trabajo", dice, no es muy distinto al que hace un banquero o un juez a diario, por eso llegará el día en que Yerbabuena esté lista para bajar del escenario por última vez. "Me encantaría que dentro de las instituciones se entienda que también [para] nosotros [los artistas flamencos] llega a un momento en que nos tenemos que jubilar", y que las condiciones laborales sean las adecuadas para que puedan disfrutar del fruto de toda una vida. "No me gustaría hacer ningún tipo de despedida para nada", dice, "me gustaría simplemente poder decir, ahora que puedo disfrutar de otras cosas, creo que es el momento de irme".

ALFONSO LOSA manages to harmonize the austerity, verticality, and elegance of the Madrid school with a vertiginous rhythm and prodigious body control. He is the most classical of the contemporaries and the most contemporary of the classics. A master of the great masters, Alfonso Losa is constantly searching for the immutable truths contained in flamenco and does not negotiate with fashions. He creates new schemes without breaking the mold. He builds without deconstructing. He works with authenticity. He dances as he is.

PATRICIA GUERRERO draws geometric shapes with her dance. She then transforms them, picking them apart and turning them back into elements of life such as fire, with a dance that she gently rocks, nurtures, wraps up, and hands to the audience as a gift of that art, raised and shaped by the magic and mystery that resides in the whitewashed walls of Granada's Albaycín neighborhood, where she too was born. Patricia Guerrero has served as the director of the Ballet Flamenco de Andalucía since 2024.

Winner of the 2017 Spanish National Dance Award, dancer, choreographer, and director MANUEL LIÑÁN was born in Granada and trained with the legendary Manolete and Mario Maya. He has been invited on numerous occasions to choreograph productions for the National Ballet of Spain, the New Spanish Ballet, and the companies of Rafaela Carrasco and Teresa Nieto. Early in his career, he co-founded a company alongside Olga Pericet, Marco Flores, and Daniel Doña: a collective that brought fresh perspectives to flamenco and contemporary dance. In 2008, Liñán embarked on his solo career, premiering Tauro. He later continued with Mundo y Aparte and Sinergia, performances that led him to some of the world's most prestigious stages, including the Jerez Festival, where he won the 2012 New Artist Award for Dance. The following year, he received the Max Award for Performing Arts as Best Male Dancer and the Flamenco Hoy Critics' Choice Award for Best Dancer. In 2014, he premiered Nómada at the Jerez Festival, confirming his status as an

extraordinary dancer and choreographer. The show later toured some of the world's leading festivals. In 2016, he presented Reversible at major international events, such as the Nîmes Festival, the Flamenco Biënnale Nederland, and the Flamenco Festival of London, earning the Critics' Choice Award at the Jerez Festival. In 2019, he revolutionized the flamenco scene with ;VIVA!, a groundbreaking show that defied traditional paradigms and celebrated freedom of expression within flamenco. With this bold and vibrant production, he has toured the world's most prestigious venues, selling out every performance along the way. In 2021, he premiered Pie de Hierro, a powerful new work that continues to captivate audiences both nationally and internationally.

COMPAÑÍA EVA YERBABUENA is an unquestionable quality label in today's artistic scene, known for professionalism, rigor, and global projection. Over the past 25 years, Eva Yerbabuena has cultivated and matured her creative essence, built on effort, attention to detail, and a continuous search for excellence. The company has become a benchmark for flamenco worldwide.

Eva Yerbabuena has seamlessly combined artistry, creativity, and quality, making her company a reference in the field. She has received recognition from the public, at a national and international level, and won awards of all kinds, including the following stand outs: National Award from the Chair of Flamencology of Jerez, Honorary Academician of the Academy of Performing Arts in Spain, Gold Medal for Merit in Fine Arts, National Dance Prize, Medal of Andalusia, Gold Medal of Granada 2017, ten Max Performing Arts Awards, II International Flamenco Giraldillo of the City of Seville, and more.

Each of her works is impeccably crafted with a reflective and intimate discourse, exploring endless perspectives. Contemporary and avantgarde, her 20 shows have toured nationally and internationally.

STANFORD MAKISHI (Vice President & Artistic Director, Dance) was appointed to his current position of Artistic Director, Dance, at New York City Center in 2021 after serving as vice president for programming since 2015. He began at the organization in 2011 as associate producer of its Fall for Dance Festival. Makishi danced with Trisha Brown from 1992 to 2006, was assistant director of her production of Winterreise, and has taught and restaged her work internationally. He also served as artistic advisor for the Ringling International Arts Festival in Sarasota, executive director of the Baryshnikov Arts Center, director of programs at the Asian Cultural Council, and director of creative services at Carnegie Hall.

MICHAEL S. ROSENBERG (President & CEO, New York City Center) has a long and distinguished career of leading performing arts institutions to nurture artists, expand audiences, and engage communities. Beginning with Drama Dept. (the Greenwich Village artist collective he

co-founded in the 90s) and carrying through to the present, he has helped develop works by playwrights, songwriters, choreographers, directors, authors, designers, visual artists, and students.
