







recognizes this as a problem she shares with other experienced dancers and with many professionals in many careers. How do you rediscover—how do you tap—the original joy that impelled you?

Over the almost 22 years since she became a member of New York City Ballet, Mearns has danced her way back from injury, heartbreak, Covid, and depression. "The world sees me as this perfect ballerina who has it all. But I've been through periods when I don't have the confidence to get to the studio in the morning—and periods when home no longer felt like home."

For Mearns, her Artists at the Center program (April 3-5) is a way of showing New York sides of her it hasn't seen before. Don't Go Home is a layered drama—plenty of talking—that arises indirectly from these dark crises of confidence that Mearns, like other dancers, has weathered. When she was first preparing the season, her Canadian dance partner and colleague, Guillaume Côté, suggested that she make these crises the subject of a story or drama based around some part of herself (she had already involved Côté: "he draws on such experience in partnering, I never have to worry about anything with him. Also neither of us take ourselves too seriously: our way of joking around in rehearsal has kept the energy really stress-free. But we're both very present, dramatically emotional, performers: we click onstage"). Côté reached out to Jonathon Young, the writer who has worked with the Canadian choreographer Crystal Pite on such much talked-of creations as Betroffenheit (2015), The Statement (2016), Revisor (2019), and Assembly Hall (2023). Young, understanding that Mearns had found recent years "a little rough," suggested that she send him thoughts. Mearns responded by sending him notes she had made over the last two years, often very dark ("thoughts that otherwise shouldn't see the light of day"). Young responded by sending her a story he had concocted around those thoughts.

"Basically, I'm playing a character named Sara who's auditioning for a role named Claire.

Claire is a character in a dance movie that is based around my [Sara's] personal story. It's partly creepy, and partly you have to go in and out of the story. Sometimes you get confused—I'm playing both Claire and the role in the movie she's auditioning for. For Claire in the movie, everything in her personal life has imploded. It's affecting her at work. She gets to the point where she is so depressed and so burnt-out that she cannot get to the theater."

For Mearns, Young's story—titled Don't Go Home—highlighted all the moods through which she'd been going "The burn-out, the depression, the stage not being my safe space anymore, the sense that home wasn't safe either: he compiled it into this 26-minute dance-theater piece. He really is good!" Mearns and her colleagues have built this work into a performance piece, with choreography by Côté. "I'll be on point; we haven't yet decided what clothes I'm wearing—but you'll see my legs."

For the program's other half, Mearns has chosen to collaborate with the dancer-choreographer Jamar Roberts, for many years a leading dancer of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. "It had always been my dream to dance with this man. He's massive but he moves so fast, and covers so much space! Then we were both artists in residence at the Vail Dance Festival last summer.

"I was amazed: I found we have the same energies, the same humor, the same attitude to the creative process. So I asked him to choreograph for me, but thinking he was now retired from the stage. Then he texted me, out of the blue, asking if he could include himself as a dancer in the piece. I screamed, I was so happy—in my text, that was just a row of exclamation marks.

"Watching Jamar re-emerge as a dancer in rehearsals has been fantastic—we're trying to keep up with him! It's going to bring the house down. (I won't be on point, but I also won't be barefoot. We're still deciding on the kind of footwear.) He's motivated and ready to go, like a freight train."

Even though Mearns does not hide from the dark areas of the soul she has encountered, she is one of nature's enthusiasts. She loves to praise her colleagues (not just Roberts and

Jones/Lee Ming Wei, and Wang Ramirez, as well as Dances of Isadora Duncan at Lincoln Center. GILBERT BOLDEN III (Dancer) is a Principal Dancer with New York City Ballet (NYCB). He was born in San Diego, California and began dancing at the age of nine in Las Vegas, Nevada. His ballet training began in 2011 at Idyllwild Arts Academy in Idyllwild, CA, and he continued his studies at The Rock School for Dance Education in Philadelphia, PA in 2013. In 2014, Mr. Bolden

enrolled at the School of American Ballet, NYCB's official school. He became an apprentice with NYCB in August 2017, joined the company as a member of the Corps de Ballet in August 2018, and was promoted to Soloist in October 2023, and Principal in 2025. Since joining NYCB, Mr. Bolden has originated featured roles in ballets by Justin Peck, Silas Farley, and Gianna Reisen. He has also been featured in works by George Balanchine, Jerome Robbins, Alexei Ratmansky, Tiler Peck, Lauren Lovette, Alysa Pires, and Claudia Schreier.

JEROBOAM BOZEMAN (Dancer), a Brooklyn native, bid farewell to the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater in June 2024, marking a graceful transition from stage to screen. A distinguished presence since joining Ailey in 2013, Bozeman was lauded by The New York Times for his "singular, rugged grace," during his breakthrough 2015 season. His artistry earned him a place on Dance Magazine's "25 to Watch" list, and a featured role in Ailey's 2018-2019 season campaign. Renowned for his commanding yet ethereal presence, Bozeman's career spans performances with The Royal Ballet, Ailey II, PHILADANCO!, and Donald Byrd's Spectrum Dance Theater. Critics have described his movement as "velvety fluid," (The New York Times) and "gentle and dignified," (The Wall Street Journal). His versatility extends beyond dance, he appeared in Vanity Fair's Maison Valentino On Love campaign and The New York Times #SpeakinginDance series. Now, Bozeman captivates on screen as the lead in Boaz Yakin's ONCE AGAIN (for the very first time), earning praise for his seamless transition into acting. Holding a degree in Psychology and proficient in ASL, he remains an inspiring force, an artist of depth, resilience, and boundless expression. GUILLAUME CÔTÉ (*Director & Choreographer*) is a native of Lac-Saint-Jean, Québec. He joined The National Ballet of Canada in 1999 and was promoted to Principal Dancer in 2004. Since

then, Mr. Côté has danced most of the major roles and has been the leading male figure of the company. As a guest artist, Mr. Côté has danced with The Royal Ballet, Bolshoi Theatre, American Ballet Theatre, New York City Ballet, Teatro alla Scala, the Mikhailovsky Theater of St-Petersburg, Teatro Colón de Buenos Aires, and the Berlin Staatsoper. In 2013, in addition to his position as a Principal Dancer, Mr. Côté assumed the role of Choreographic Associate with The National Ballet of Canada and today eight of his works are part of the company's repertoire. In 2021, he founded his own company, Côté Danse which has since then attracted significant attention with over 150 performances in 25 cities in its first four years of existence. Mr. Côté was awarded "La médaille de l'Assemblée Nationale du Québec" for his work in the arts and was appointed a Chevalier de l'Ordre national du Québec, the highest distinction given by the government of Quebec. JONATHON YOUNG (Director & Writer) is a Canadian theater artist based in Toronto. He is Playwright-in-Residence with Kidd Pivot, cofounder of Electric Company Theatre, and an award-winning actor working across Canada in theatre, film, and television. With Kidd Pivot, Young creates alongside choreographer Crystal Pite. Their productions (Assembly Hall, Revisor, toured internationally, Betroffenheit) have winning two Olivier Awards for Best New Dance Production. Revisor and Betroffenheit were filmed by the BBC and Betroffenheit received The Golden Prague, and the Rose d'Or Award in Berlin. In 2016 they created The Statement for Nederlands Dans Theater which was performed at New York City Center, The Kennedy Center, and is now included in the repertoire of London's Royal Ballet. With his collaborators at Electric Company, Young has written and devised over twenty original productions since the company's inception in 1996. Young is the recipient of the UK National Dance Award.

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MAKISHI (Vice STANFORD & Artistic Director, Dance, New York City Center) was appointed to his current position of Artistic Director, Dance, at New York City Center in 2021 after serving as vice president for programming since 2015. He began at the organization in 2011 as associate producer of its Fall for Dance Festival. Makishi danced with Trisha Brown from 1992 to 2006, was assistant director of her production of Winterreise, and has taught and restaged her work internationally. He also served as artistic advisor for the Ringling International Arts Festival in Sarasota, executive director of the Baryshnikov Arts Center, director of programs at the Asian Cultural Council, and director of creative services at Carnegie Hall.

MICHAEL S. ROSENBERG (President & CEO, New York City Center) has a long and distinguished career of leading performing arts institutions to nurture artists, expand audiences, and engage communities. Beginning with Drama Dept. (the Greenwich Village artist collective he co-founded in the 90s) and carrying through to the present, he has helped develop works by playwrights, songwriters, choreographers, directors, authors, designers, visual artists, and students. Playhouse, Rosenberg worked with Artistic Director Christopher Ashley and the staff to oversee the development and production of a host of acclaimed productions, many of which transferred to Broadway, Off-Broadway, and the West End—including the international smash hit Come from Away. More recently, as Managing Director of McCarter Theatre Center, Rosenberg was part of the evolution of the historic theater, expanding programming to include family-friendly performances and multidisciplinary events. His work in building diversity, equity, and inclusion encompasses artists, audiences, and administrators alike.

NEW YORK CITY CENTER has played a defining role in the cultural life of the city since 1943. The distinctive Neo-Moorish building was founded by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia as Manhattan's first performing arts center with the mission of making the best in theater, dance, and music accessible to all audiences.
